# **Build Activity**

Habitat Heartland Ontario enjoyed a solid build program in 2016. We were able to build in Oxford, Middlesex and Perth Counties, building six homes and acquiring an additional piece of land in Ingersoll. Our build program is supported by community donations of goods and funds, and our donors can have confidence knowing that every dollar they donate goes directly to building homes for low income and hard working local families.

The first three homes were completed on our 15 lot Forbes St project in London. We were humbled by the tremendous support from our military, fire, police and EMS services, and the Brockett family received their first home.

Community Living London partnered with us to fundraise and build two additional homes on Forbes St.. This partnership allowed Community Living London to change the lives of five men who moved from geared to income rental housing into beautiful living conditions. Ingersoll's newest Habitat family was the five member Sweeney family. With the support of an active and dedicated Steering Committee in Ingersoll, we were able to complete a clean and safe home for this family who have children with special needs.

The Hill family from Listowel received an awesome Christmas present supported by a community led Steering Committee there, when they took possession of their Listowel home in December.

A special thank you goes out to our Steering Committees in Ingersoll and Listowel. Their selfless efforts to fundraise

and engage the entire community helped to build these homes and assist two families in achieving their dreams of home ownership.

John Latosinsky, a student at Lester B Pearson School for the Arts in London, Ontario won the Genworth Meaning of Home contest, which resulted in a \$25,000 gift to our build program. This is the poem that won the competition.

### **Meaning of Home**

# **ReStore Activity**



2016 represented a year of growth for our ReStores. Just prior to the start of the year Habitat Heartland opened a St. Thomas ReStore which bolstered optimism regarding a prosperous upcoming year. We could not be happier with the performance of the St. Thomas ReStore during the first full year of operations. Our Assistant Manager Dana Erickson, her staff and volunteers have done a wonderful job starting the new store on the right foot and we thank the community for their tremendous support.

The strength of the ReStore staff foundation showed its commitment and depth, working through a busy 2016. The organization posted great results, projecting continued growth and prospects for the future. In 2016, the ReStores lost two key members of our management team to retirement. Peter Myts, Regional ReStores Manager, and Steve Hadskis, the London and Area ReStores Manager, were instrumental in guiding our business through the growth and expansion of the last few years. Their experience, dedication and strength will be missed. However, when one door closes another door opens and we are very happy to be able to fill the two positions with equally valuable people. Barb Ransome, formerly Manager of the Stratford and Woodstock ReStores, moved into the Regional ReStore Manager's position. Also, Habitat Heartland welcomed Jamie Gilliland, a former manager of the Guelph ReStore, now West Region ReStore Manager, responsible for operations of our two London locations as and the St. Thomas ReStore

In January, 2017, Habitat Heartland opened a sixth ReStore in Listowel, and we will continue to look at opportunities to grow our network in 2017. The ReStores continue to be proud of the impact we make on the environment and the community through our efforts in salvage and recycling. We actively assess our process internally to recycle more products back into our store network as well as a robust - recycling and metal refinement that helps us divert thousands of tons of material from our local landfills. We continued to partner with other social agencies this year in providing job training or roles for individuals from organizations such as ACN, Pathways, and CMHA to name just a few. Through their work with the ReStore they are able to obtain valuable hands-on experience in multiple roles to assist them in their personal growth for the future. Our ReStore revenues continue to fund our operations and allow all of our fund raising dollars to be directly put to building homes. ReStore is a valued entity and an integral part of our organization.






# **Carolyn Carroll - Habitat Heartland Founders Award 2016**

"Before I applied to be a volunteer for Habitat, I didn't really know what I was looking for in my life. At the time my children were grown and on their own. I was speaking with a co-worker who was volunteering for Habitat. The more she told me, the more it tugged at me. I've been very blessed with a good career, family and home and our discussions made me realize I wanted to do some good for others too and with my work background I thought it would be a good fit. I jumped in and never looked back. Over the years I've met some wonderful people both on the committee and Habitat Partner families that apply. Oh, the families - they made me smile. On a number of occasions I had a gut



feeling right away they would be a good fit for Habitat even before the home visits began. Seeing some of the families again after they had been approved gave me such joy, and the excitement in their eyes and smiles on their faces reminded me I was a tiny part of that. That was what it was about to me - giving hope and security to families who might not have ever had the opportunity without Habitat."

Carolyn is a devoted and hardworking member of our team at Habitat for Humanity. Committed to fulfilling our mission - To mobilize volunteers and partners in providing opportunities for families to achieve affordable and sustainable home ownership as a means of breaking the cycle of poverty and strengthening communities. Carolyn has been with Habitat for 9 years. During this time, she has assisted with special events including Jeans 'n Classics, helped us as a Habitat Ambassador during community outreach events and served on the Family Selection & Support Committee. Without key volunteers like Carolyn, we could not have the impact in the community that we do!



# Our International Impact

Last year I had the amazing opportunity to work with three other student leaders and plan our annual reading week volunteer trip. We brought together a group of 28 volunteers and in February we travelled to Tuscaloosa, Alabama to help build and renovate two houses for those affected by the tornado in 2011. During our eight days in Tuscaloosa we helped other Habitat volunteers with the two projects. Hearing the families stories and helping them build a home was such a rewarding experience and we had the chance to meet the families as well! We got to experience a new culture and meet so many amazing individuals. The great thing about Habitat for Humanity is that we get to work with these families who help us build their future homes. 




# **Financial Report**

### Revenue 2016




